There is a considerable amount written in the Icelandic sagas and other accounts of Viking Age society about male honor. In order to understand the place of female honor in the Icelandic sagas, it is important to first discuss what scholars consider male honor in the sagas. Walther Gehl discusses the strong role of male honor in the Icelandic saga.

sagas speak most often of Norwegians' and Icelanders' dealings with the Finnar, but all of Scandinavia and beyond falls within their purview. For this reason, while I describe the sagas and their writers as Icelandic, the term "Norse" will be used as a catchall term.
